Assignments:

There will be 4-5 assignments for this course. One of these assignments will be an essay, and another will be a program that you will write. The other assignments will consist of short answer questions.

Quizzes:

There will be 3-4 quizzes to help you prepare for the exams.

Participation:

- Attendance is required.
- Blog: You are required to maintain a blog and you have to post to it on a weekly basis. You are also required to post at least one substantive comment on your classmates' blog per week.
- Readings: You should come to class having done the readings assigned for that period. You will get
 much less out of class meetings and blogging if you do not do all of the assigned readings on
 time. There will be some reading/study questions associated with the readings that you will need to
 complete before the start of class.
- Class Discussions: You are required to participate regularly in class discussions. Your contributions should be thoughtful, on topic, and respectful of others.

Midterm Exam:

The midterm will be on Friday, February 22 and will be a written, closed book exam on the topics covered so far in the class.

Final Exam:

The final exam will be on Monday, March 18 and will be a written, closed book exam on the topics covered in the class.
